The person taking the action must not clear more than 2,591 ha of the EPBC listed White Box – Yellow Box –Blakelys Red Gum Grassy Woodland and Derived Native Grassland Ecological Community (572 ha of woodland and 2019 ha derived native grassland) within the Mount Pleasant Project Area identified in Appendix A of these conditions.</p>

The person taking the action must register a legally binding conservation covenant over the Biodiversity Management Areas identified in the map at Appendix B no later than 25 November 2019. A detailed Weed Project Plan governing the provision and timing of the 1,000,000 funding for the activities and outcomes must be developed. Original dated 29/02/2012	<p><b>Advisory committee</b></p> <p>22. The person undertaking the action must, within 6 months of this approval, establish an advisory committee to review and provide advice on the management activities of the Biodiversity Management Areas.</p>
Original dated 29/02/2012	<p>23. Within 3 months of establishing the advisory committee, the person undertaking the action must provide to the Minister for approval the terms of reference for the advisory committee. All survey data collected for the project must be collected and recorded so as to conform to data standards notified from time to time by the <b>department</b>. When requested by the <b>department</b>, the proponent must provide to the <b>department</b> all species and ecological survey data and related survey information from ecological surveys undertaken for <b>MNES</b>. This survey data must be provided within 30 business days of request, or in a timeframe agreed to by the <b>department</b> in writing. The <b>department</b> may use the survey data for other purposes.</p>

Within three months of every 12 month anniversary of the <b>commencement of construction</b> , the person taking the action must publish a report on their website addressing compliance with each of the conditions of this approval, including implementation of any management plans as specified in the conditions. Documentary evidence providing proof of the date of publication and non-compliance with any of the conditions of this approval must be provided to the <b>department</b> at the same time as the compliance report is published. The person taking the action must also notify any non-compliance with this approval to the department in writing within two business days of becoming aware of the non-compliance.

Original dated 29/02/2012	<b>Clearance of native vegetation</b> - means the cutting down, felling, thinning, logging, removing, killing, destroying, poisoning, ringbarking, uprooting or burning of native vegetation.
